Butterfield-Odin Public School E-Learning Days Plan Overview

On a school day canceled for inclement weather, Butterfield-Odin School will minimize the disruption to student learning through E-Learning. E-Learning allows students and educators to extend learning past the classroom walls and supports students. The E-Learning format also ensures that students will not be required to make up school days in the spring/summer.

On E-Learning Days, Parents/Guardians will receive an automated phone call via the Infinite Campus service and announcements will be made on the usual radio and television channels, as well as posted on the District's website.

The activities that students will be asked to accomplish vary depending on their grade level and the learning which might have occurred in the classroom as if school were in session. The following more thoroughly explains the plan "per grade level".

Grades Pk-6

Learning activities will be sent home and posted on our website with learning options for the day which correspond to the curriculum.

On an E-Learning Day, students will:

- Complete activities from the grade level choice board which can be found on the teacher's webpage or was passed out
- Sign and return the activity sheet to their teacher on the next school day
- In advance, students will know where to access and be prepared to complete E-Learning Day activities

On an E-Learning Day, parents will:

- Monitor student progress on E-Learning Day activities
- Communicate questions for teachers via email
- · Sign and return activity sheets with students to school on the next school day

Grades 7-12

Digital learning platforms will be used to communicate learning activities by 8:10 am and educators will be available for questions via email until 3:00 pm.

On an E-Learning Day, Grade 7-12 students will:

- Access their class learning site * (through the Learning Management System, LMS, called Schoology)
- Complete their E-Learning Day assignments
- Participate in their E-Learning Day activities
- · Communicate questions for teachers via email, phone, or another planned approach
- In advance, students will know where to access and be able to look at their teacher's web page

On an E-Learning Day, the parents of grade 7-12 students will:

Monitor student progress on E-Learning Day activities, as appropriate and necessary
